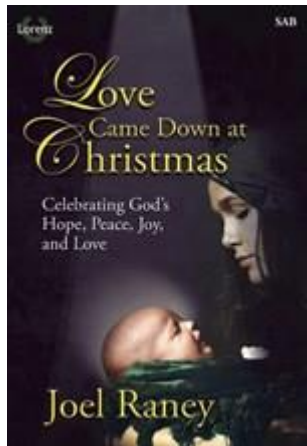

# WHICH VERSION OF THE BIBLE?

Our youth are being encouraged with incentives to bring their Bibles every Sunday for sermons and Sunday School so that they will take notes, highlight, and get personal with their own Word of God in hand. With the holidays approaching and gift ideas abounding, we discussed what version of the Bible should we be reading. There are so many to choose from, but what is really the best version of the Bible to study?

The answer is not as hard as you might think. The Holy Spirit is your best tool to understand scripture, so regardless of the translation, as long as you're asking God for help when you open the pages, you're certain to find His voice speaking to you. However, that voice can be easier to identify if you're able to comprehend what you're reading.

## **APPS:**

In a world where technology is at your fingertips, it should be no surprise that the Bible is too. There are several free Bible apps for your smart devices that allow you to view different translations or even have chapters read audibly to you. They allow highlighting and commenting features in these apps will save your notes and allow you to share scripture digitally at the click of a button.

Personally I use YouVersion which allows me also to pick study plans and do them with friends from my contact lists that also have the app. While this form of technology is extremely useful in day-to-day use and quick references, it is no substitute for your own personal hard copy Bible that you can tangibly touch, date, highlight, and take notes in. There's just something about having The Word that belongs to you in ink and paper glory.

## **How to Pick a Translation:**

First, look for a version that is easy to read for you. If you love the poetic power in the King James Version and enjoy looking up the meaning behind words the English language has not used in the 400 years since it was first translated, then by all means! There is power and strength and accuracy in it's translation, but if you find it a chore to read, you're better off with a



more modern translation. Go to your local Bible store or even do a little sample reading online by clicking through the available versions on BibleGateway.com. Pick the one that speaks to you in the clearest and most understandable phrases; popular and accurate translations used are the NIV, NIRV, NLT or NKJV.

The Message Bible has an exciting and vibrant new way of interpreting scripture that will make you see the stories and settings in a brand new way, but be sure that you frequently compare it to a more literal translation for accuracy. My personal favorite is the Amplified version, which often helps to redefine commonly used terms in parenthesis right there in the story (grace, mercy, etc.) and additional scripture references right there in the text that mirror the same theme or thought or story line and even reveal where the New Testament is quoting straight from the Old Testament writings.

### **Extra Features:**

Many Bibles come with features like commentary from scholars, specific pastors, and evangelists, red letters for Jesus' spoken words, maps, pictures, or short prayers. Think about whether or not you tend to enjoy having some guidance from others in commentary. Do you prefer to see Jesus' words in red or is that distracting? Do you care about geography, history, or culture clarification?

Many Bibles come with these options but in a variety of combinations. Some might find it helpful to have a concordance (an alphabetical list of words and their associated scriptures) so you can turn directly to passages pertaining to a word or subject (ex: baptism.) Lexicons might be included to help translate words exactly from their original Greek or Hebrew.

Binding can be a consideration also. Hardcover Bibles are useful for someone who takes their Bible on the go regularly and can stand up to the test of time and use better. They also are less floppy in Bible cases which have useful pockets for study tools, notebooks, and highlighters, but some prefer the look of their leather-bound or the cost efficiency of paperback. It's all a matter of preference.

And what about the Apocrypha? Although generally excluded from Protestant Bibles, these 14 books used to be interspersed throughout the Old Testament writings, and while considered secondary in importance to the Old Testament writings we have today, they were widely





embraced as good for reading, relevantly historical, and useful for personal edification. Have you read the whole Bible yet? If so, maybe check the Apocrypha out and ask the Holy Spirit what might be in those books for you.

The truth of the matter is that any translation at all is better than not reading your Bible. Pick it up. Fall in love with it. Find a way to make it something you turn to daily, and I promise that it will become your treasure. Meet God there every day.
