## Worship

Over the past month and a half, Christians throughout America and the world have had our understanding of worship greatly expanded. We have been unable to meet as a congregation but have still found ways to bring glory to God. Some churches have gone to live-streaming a full service on various platforms. Some have gone to “drive-in church.” Others have just provided an audio sermon. Still others have provided only resources to members. KirkWood has largely relied on pre-recorded video with links in the bulletin to songs already available on YouTube. I hope that you have been able to participate in these each Sunday and even share them with family and friends. The best part of putting the service online is that we have been able to reach people who otherwise would not have made it to the service.

We do not know when the conditions will be right to resume services. We (the Worship Committee and Session) are closely listening to guidance from health and government officials, trying to identify at what point the risk will be low enough that we can meet. This could be in several weeks; it could be in a few months. Either way, know that we are already starting to think about how best to resume worship that minimizes the health risk without sacrificing the culture and components of worship that make KirkWood the loving and caring family that it is.

Until such time as we are able to resume corporate worship, there are some things that you can do. Each Sunday, an online version of the service is posted to the KirkWood website. Take the time to watch this and participate with the guidance and resources provided in the online bulletin. Through the sermons page of the web site, there is also audio recordings of nearly every sermon going back five years, so if you are craving more teaching, these are always available. Also, please feel free to share the online service to friends and family, through email, social media, or even word of mouth. Lastly, and most importantly, pray. We will have some big choices coming up in how and when we resume in-person worship. Pray that God will provide abundant wisdom to those making these decisions.

# HYMN-SPIRATION

## **Now Thank We All our God (listen to this recording)**

For modern American Protestant churchgoers, the hymn “Now Thank We All our God” likely conjures up an image of a congregation singing in unison, a pipe organ blasting away (or perhaps Tina at the piano), and a church full of people thinking about the approaching feast of stuffed turkey with cranberry sauce.

In order to understand where this hymn came from, I would like to offer a very different image: a minister and his family sing this hymn before dinner to thank God for the scraps of food they have on the table in their meager home in a desolate refugee city that is afflicted with famine and disease and war.

Martin Rinckart (1586-1649) was an accomplished musician who spent most of his career as a musician and archdeacon in the city of Eilenburg (eastern Germany.) The greater part of Rinckart’s professional life was passed amid the horrors of the Thirty Years War. Eilenburg, being a walled town, became a refuge for fugitives from all around, and being so overcrowded, suffered from pestilence and famine.

During the great pestilence of 1637, the Superintendent went away for a change of air and couldn’t be persuaded to return; and on August 7<sup>th</sup>, Rinckart had to officiate at the funerals of two of the town clergy.

Rinckart thus for some time was the only clergyman in the place and often read the funeral service over some 40-50 persons a day (in all over 4,480 people.)

At last the refugees had to be buried in trenches without service, and during the whole epidemic, some 8,000 persons died including his wife.

In the midst of these horrors, it’s difficult to imagine maintaining faith and praising God, and yet, that’s exactly what Rinckart did.



Sometime in the next twenty years, he wrote the hymn, “Now Thank We All our God,” originally meant to be a prayer said before meals. Rinkart could recognize that our God is faithful, and even when the world looks bleak, God is “bounteous” and full of blessings, if only we look for them.

Blessing as seemingly small as a dinner meal or as large as the end of a brutal war and unnecessary bloodshed are all reasons to lift up our thanks to God, with our hearts, our hands and our voices.

The theme is very clear and straightforward. It’s an exhortation to us, to one another, to thank our God with everything we are—with our heart, with our hands, with our voices.

Our choir room has had a makeover of sorts. Thanks to our fabulous KirkWood remodeling team headed by Kirk Reno, we now have solid walls (painted a lovely shade of light blue-gray-green) and a new white board.

We also rearranged the room to make more space for our children’s choir and worship choir rehearsals. Special thanks to Nancy Ridsen, our tireless choir librarian!

We look forward to getting back to work in our new, improved space.

# BLOOD DRIVE & KIRKWOOD SILVER

The next Kirkwood Blood Drive is scheduled for **THURSDAY, May 21<sup>st</sup>** from 2:00-7:00 p.m. **DUE TO THE CURRENT RESTRICTIONS DURING THIS TIME, WE WILL BE HOLDING THIS DRIVE AT THE VICTORY YMCA ACROSS THE STREET.** Also, due to the current distance and number of people allowed to congregate together, there will be fewer appointments available, so making your appointments ahead of time is highly recommended. The Red Cross will be using a system where one representative will be assigned to one donor from registration, history and donation, and exercising the highest protocols for safety and hygiene dictated by the CDC and the Red Cross. In the interest of maintaining the highest hygiene standards, we will not be serving a meal at this drive. There will be snacks provided by the Red Cross as always.

If you would like to save yourself some time on drive day, you can access the **RAPIDPASS**. RAPIDPASS lets you do the prescreen process from your phone or computer and can save you as much as 15-20 minutes when you get to the drive. The Red Cross will send a link to your email the day of the drive. There is an urgent need for all types of blood now and always. Please prayerfully consider coming out and donating. ## **Another Way to Give to KirkWood**

Did you know you can contribute directly to KirkWood from your traditional or inherited IRA?

A Qualified Charitable Donation (QCD) allows individuals who are at least age 70½ (as of this writing) to direct all or part of an IRA distribution directly to KirkWood. You can request a distribution, up to \$100,000, from your IRA made payable to KirkWood without any additional tax consequences. Of course, when you contribute directly from your IRA to KirkWood, you cannot take a charitable donation for the QCD, but for many it could provide a better tax benefit.

QCDs require no special reporting by your IRA custodian; you will receive an IRS Form 1099-R for the distribution. You will need to provide this form to your tax advisor during tax preparation time. If you have already taken your Required Minimum Distribution for this calendar year, the amount cannot be rolled back into your IRA because the IRS considers the first dollars out of your IRA as your RMD and you cannot rollover an RMD. A conversation with your investment professional may be helpful in determining what strategy works best in your financial situation.

## **Food Drive Partnership with Scout Troop #54 and Thrive Peninsula**

This food drive originated prior to the onset of COVID-19 and the temporary closure of the church building. Scout Troop #54 has suspended the event at this time; donations received will be forwarded to Thrive Peninsula as originally scheduled.
