

KWPC family -

Well, now it's official! How exciting! I am both humbled and overjoyed that I'll be moving soon down to "the peninsula" and joining you!

If the early stages of a pastoral search are marked by uncertainty and faith, and the middle stages by patience and wisdom (as the list of candidates gets shorter and shorter), these last stages of a pastoral transition can feel like "hurry up and wait." You're ready, I'm ready, but it's not quite time to start running the race of faith together

(1st Corinthians 9:24,26).



William Bridges, a seminal figure in the field of organizational and church transitions, said, “An unsuccessful transition starts with a bad ending.” Let’s flip that and say it positively – “A successful transition starts with a good ending.” That begs the question – what constitutes a “good ending”? And whatever the answer, it’s probably where you should focus your attention and energy now as Pastor Charles prepares to leave, and I get ready to step into his shoes. (I hope to be guided by the same question as I make ready to exit my interim role at Culpeper Presbyterian, and pass the torch to their next installed minister.)

A good ending includes celebrating your time together, and how you’ve been impacted by each other. It’s a congregational application of that great quote from medieval theologian Meister Eckhart, “If the only prayer you said was, ‘Thank you,’ it would be enough.” So take time to thank Pastor Charles, and be specific in it: why particularly are you grateful that God brought him to you as your interim? Likewise, let him articulate his gratitude to you. These bonds of thanksgiving are imperishable, they’ll last the rest of your life and beyond.

A good ending also involves “remembering to remember.” That phrase is a cliché in neurology and refers to what’s called “prospective memory,” a unique brain function related to memory. In short, in order to remember those experiences, lessons, and conversations that you want to, you have to pause and reflect upon them long enough to encode them in your long-term memory. Otherwise, despite your best intentions, you’ll lose them in the fog of fleeting time. So my counsel is to be purposeful over the next few weeks to share with each other what you want to remember from your interim journey: e.g., what insight did you gain, what will you cherish, how did you change, etc. You can do this as a congregation, in your small groups, at Session, and on your committees. As Nobel Prize winning Columbian writer Gabriel Garcia Marquez puts it, “Life is not what one lived, but what one remembers and how one remembers it in order to recount it.”

WORSHIP

Worship

In John Chapter 4, the Samaritan woman at the well asks Jesus about Worship. “²⁰ Our ancestors worshiped on this mountain, but you say that the place where people must worship is in Jerusalem.” ²¹ Jesus said to her, “Woman, believe me, the hour is coming when you will worship the Father neither on this mountain nor in Jerusalem.”

The hour has been when we worship the Father not in a building on Hampton Highway, but in our homes. We *will* be able to resume in-person worship at KirkWood. *When* is not yet known. Some churches have chosen to open with state specified restrictions on capacity and social distancing. There is a lot of additional information that indicates that this still presents a fair amount of risk, and the social distancing requirements would greatly hinder the open and welcoming family feel that makes KirkWood what it is.

When we do determine the risk of an outbreak is low enough to warrant opening, there will be some changes. At the time of writing this, the CDC is expected to release guidelines for worship services. Some possible changes include shorter services, no passing of items, directed traffic flow, and no printed bulletins. One of things that is apparent is that singing will need to be reduced or temporarily eliminated, as singing expels a large amount of virus particles that can travel through most masks. With this, we will be exploring other means of worshipping God. Know that with each change, we are considering not just the health risk, but the risk to what makes KirkWood the body that it is.

As you eagerly await worshipping in-person, we ask several things as members of KirkWood. Please continue to make use of online resources including KirkWood’s online worship. If you have ideas and are willing to enable worship beyond singing, we would love to hear them. Lastly, please pray: for wisdom and guidance, for the health of our congregation, and for those who are missing the face-to-face and physical contact that are such a part of our in-person worship experience.

We had 42 donors signed in, several deferrals, but were lucky to have several donors who could give two units (Tony Swears and Don Nelson from Kirkwood), and we were able to make up for the ones who could not. Thanks to our KirkWood volunteers for coming out to help with registration. Food Collection

Our 3rd food collection (drop-off) event at KirkWood is happening again on Saturday, June 6th from 9:00 a.m. - 12:00 p.m. Please drive-by with non-perishable items or monetary donations for St. Luke’s Food Pantry and the Virginia Peninsula Foodbank. This crisis is hurting those most vulnerable in our neighborhoods; your donations make a huge difference!

Thank You, KirkWood! On Saturday, May 2nd, we collected 191 bags of groceries and a total of \$3,620 in monetary donations. Broken down: \$1,040 went to the Virginia Peninsula Foodbank and \$2,580 for St. Luke’s Food Pantry. The Foodbank said the donated food was 1,402 pounds and will provide 5,328 meals for the community!

KirkWood has been graciously providing meals for vets who are in transition from homelessness. A big thank you to everyone who has helped sustain this ministry, and we are asking for your continued help.

We provide meals for two houses with five men each on Mondays and Thursdays.
