A Message from our Pastor Chris Shearer



The Old Normal, The New Normal, and The Next Normal – Church During and After the Pandemic #2:

In this article, I'd like to give you access to some of the great research going on right now about how our Covid year is affecting and transforming the American church. I'll be summarizing the recent work of four primary researchers: Carey Nieuwhof, The Barna Group, Thom Rainer, and Tony Morgan.

If we want KirkWood to emerge from the pandemic stronger for it, and having learned lessons during it that will carry it forward into a bright future, we'd be wise to heed and apply these insights in a way that suits our distinct congregation.

1) The congregation will be bigger than those who gather at a centralized facility.

As long as there are people, people will gather. But, here's what Covid is teaching us – that won't always be at a centralized facility.

For decades, in-person attendance of worship services and educational classes has been in decline. Likewise over the same time frame, those who are committed to a church have been attending in-person events less often (that is, in your building.) But, and this is crucial, neither necessarily indicates a decline in engagement, devotion, or attachment. In fact, gathering

Christians in one place at one time (that is, Sunday morning attendance) was never the point of church; engagement, discipleship, and transformation was, and always will be, and that can happen online or in homes as much as at a church building.

Like shopping, work, and school have been altered irrevocably by the internet, so too has church. In fact, the Covid crisis has just accelerated the pace of trends that have been underway for the past 20 years.

To go one step further, churches leaning into the future will realize that on demand learning and involvement outweighs live-streaming/participation. To see the merit of such a claim, just think for a moment about how Netflix, Amazon Prime, Hulu, and other on-demand entertainment outlets/sites have completely changed what we watch, how we watch, and when we watch. So archiving older sermons, classes, and learning material online is key, as is offering self-guided resources to go deeper into a subject and using social media frequently and strategically.

As Carey Nieuwhof puts it, “We will use the building to reach people online, not use online to bring people to our building,” and “The digital genie is out of the bottle.”

The future of church shouldn’t be confined to full sanctuaries on Sunday morning; it’s viewing online, engaging in online classes and groups, and micro- or house gatherings. This is where church is going in the 21st-century, especially as the financial base of many churches erodes due to declining attendance and an aging congregation. If this is true, then it’s sobering to realize that before the Covid epidemic, only 21% of churches reported having a coherent, prioritized online ministry strategy (Tony Morgan.)

2) There is generational tension about the future of church.

As reported by The Barna Group, only 40% of Gen Z and millennials prefer attending in-person worship at a centralized facility. That is, those under the age of 39. For Gen X, or Baby Busters, it’s slightly higher.

Now consider this, 71% of Baby Boomers (those in their mid-50s to mid-70s) prefer in-person church worship and groups, representing a 30% gap between them and the younger generations, setting up a generational conflict about the methodology of church going forward.

But this doesn’t have to be an either/or, winner take all issue. Instead, as Carey Nieuwhof suggests, a wise church might have two distinct ministry strategies to reach these two distinct





age ranges – those above 55, and those below 55, or, if you will, those who find the 20th-century version of church more meaningful and those who don't, and prefer a more 21st-century expression. While it's true that in-person gatherings provide an experience and connection that nothing else can, they will comprise less of a younger adult's overall church involvement.



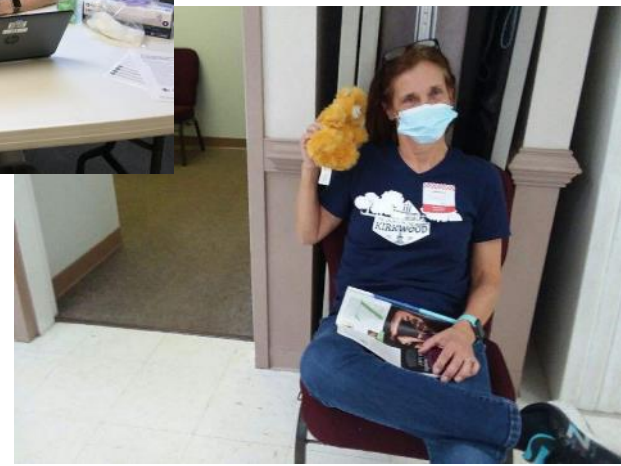

KIRKWOOD DANCE PROJECT

Praise dancing is a liturgical or spiritual dance that incorporates music and movement as a form of worship rather than as an expression of art or as entertainment. Praise dancers use their bodies to express the word and spirit of God.

Although the definition remains straightforward, at its core the depth and meaning of liturgical dance holds great purpose, and biblical origins. One of the most common mentions of dance in the bible references King David in 2 Samuel 6:14, *"And David danced with all his might before the Lord"*.

But what is the purpose behind King David's dance? Biblical scholars have denoted that the significance of this passage, indicates that David's dance was a form of his worship and love for God. His dance was a communication of praise and a demonstration of Honor.



On Sunday, November 22nd, the KirkWood Dance Project was finally realized as Emily Fisher presented a dance interpretation of the song "Come as You Are". Emily is majoring in dance and psychology and hopes to become a dance therapist. We are happy to put Emily's talent to good use at KirkWood. She will present another dance on Christmas Eve.

NOVEMBER 2020 SESSION SUMMARY

Session

- Nancy Risen was approved to be Session Clerk for 2021.
- Governor Northam's Amended Order 67 for COVID – Groups of 250 lowered to 25 for both inside and outside; this does not apply to religious services or educational institutions. This does apply to religious groups and scouts. Also groups over 25 people cannot be split into two separate groups. Masks required for 5 year olds and up. Social distancing is required for all gatherings.
- The Christian Education & Property and Facilities Committees will work on a joint proposal for a moveable volleyball net and tetherball, as well as a plan going forward for the playground.
- Hallway bulletin boards will be hung in early December and new flooring will be done in early 2021.
- On January 23rd, we will hold a drive-by chili dinner from 4:00-6:00 p.m. Sign-ups will be required.
- Our “stewardship Sundays” will be 11/15 and 11/22, on which we'll also begin to collect pledge cards.
- The Outreach Committee is working on an Advent prayer path on the church grounds.
- Pastor Chris is beginning to work with the PLD (Planning and Leadership Development Committee) on some initial strategic planning questions.
