Ancient Future Mission (Week 3): Go and Tell Yesterday's Sermon - In 10 Sentences or Less

1) Yesterday we covered the 3rd of four major reasons why early Christianity grew so rapidly when it should not have: we summarized that facet of their mission, "Go and Tell."

- 2) Go and be, go and love, and go and tell (the first three weeks of this series) are linked together by this well-known
- statement by St. Francis of Assisi, "Preach the gospel at all times; use words when necessary." Talking about Christianity to non-Christians means rings hollow without a prior commitment to Christian character and love, but likewise sometimes that telling is necessary.
- 3) We spent time yesterday reflecting on the single most well-known statement about Christian mission in the New Testament - Matthew 28.18-20, called The Great Commission.
- 4) In short, what we see is that we who are disciples of Jesus invite others into the same process of being Jesus' disciples (interestingly, this was also the apostle Paul's strategy disciples who generate more disciples; see 2 Timothy 2.2).
- 5) Disciple is better, more substantial word for those of us who identify with Jesus, as opposed to the more superficial terms "believers" or even "Christians."
- 6) Disciples are students: humble, aware of their own incompletion, more about questions than answers, keenly aware of both their admiration and need of their Teacher.
- 7) Obedience to what Christ taught is the key distinguisher of a disciple. Obedience is not a heavy or burdensome concept, but rather something that frees us to experience true happiness and our real selves.
- 8) As disciples, we go and tell others about the only authority worth our highest, deepest, and greatest allegiance - Jesus. No other commitment of ours should compete with or can measure up to this one.
- 9) Brian McLaren encapsulates the mission of the church in three short words "More, Better Disciples."
- 10) David Kinnaman, in his book "unChristian: What a New Generation Really Thinks about Christianity... and Why It Matters" writes, "Most people in America, when they are exposed to the Christian faith, are not being transformed. They take one step into the door, and the journey ends. They are not being allowed, encouraged, or equipped to love or to think like Christ. Yet in many ways a focus on spiritual formation fits what a new generation is really seeking. Transformation is a process, a journey, not a one-time decision. Transformation only occurs through discipleship."
