Easter is a season, not a day. Did you know that?

We call the days between Resurrection Sunday and Pentecost "Eastertide." I've always liked that turn of phrase – "Eastertide" – it sounds like ocean waves crashing into the shore, a force no mere mortal can stop. You can hear the sheer power of resurrection in the title "Eastertide" more than in the more generic "Easter." There's a

rhythm to it - a boom, then spray, then a pregnant pause, and then the cycle repeats and repeats itself over and over again. God's work that began with Jesus' rising is unrelenting.

Here's a great devotional from The United Church of Christ to help us gleefully and gratefully ride the waves of Eastertide this year...To be a Christian is to surf on the crest of God's renewal of all things:

"Hallelujah is Forever

God's anger is but for a moment; God's favor is for a lifetime. Weeping may linger for the night, but joy comes in the morning. – Psalm 30:5 (NRSV)

The other day, my wife made her famous apple pie. Only it wasn't. She took the recipe from a different place, thinking it was the usual. When the pie came out, she knew something wasn't



right. The apples had overcooked. The crust wasn't flaky. It tasted like nothing.

The next week she tried again and discovered her mistake. The two recipes were nearly identical. The difference was just 1/4 cup of flour and 1/2 cup of shortening. But from our first bites of the second pie, we knew: Yes! That's the way it's supposed to be.

Baking is a delicate balance. So is faith.

Easter, like Lent, is supposed to be a season. Fifty days stretching to Pentecost. Seven weeks of celebration, resurrection, and joy. It's called Eastertide. Don't feel bad if you didn't know. No one does.

Many of us observe 40 days of solemn introspection at Lent. We give things up. We take things on. We remember we are dust. We bury our hallelujahs.

Then, for one glorious morning, it's lilies and trumpets and candy-filled plastic eggs; 40 parts Lent to 1 part Easter.

That's the wrong recipe. The original calls for 50x as much! Fifty times as many rolled away stones! Fifty times as many empty tombs! Fifty times as much death-defeating love! Imagine the difference. In your life. In your church. In our world.

The balance is off. It's time to switch recipes. Welcome to Eastertide.

Prayer - Joyful God, death-defeating Love: Your anger is for a moment, your favor is for a lifetime. Death has had its day, joy has come. Hallelujah! Amen!"






Keeping Busy; Helping Others

Sleep in Heavenly Peace is Not Just a Song


On a dreary Saturday morning in mid-February, 41 KirkWoodians met at Briarfield School in Hampton to assemble beds for children in need. What a meaningful experience!

Sleep in Heavenly Peace (SHP) is a non-profit organization that builds and delivers beds to children who do not have a bed. Their motto is: "No kid *sleeps* on the floor in our town!"

KirkWood participated as a group on this particular Build Day and it was a great experience for all who were able to attend. There was something to do for all skill levels... from the moment we arrived, signed in, and got our safety gear ... until the last SHP logo was branded on the final headboard of the day. Volunteers – under the guidance of SHP Chapter team members – built bunks in an assembly line setup. There were stations for sanding, drilling, assembling, staining, and branding the wood. What started as a pile of raw lumber from the hardware store became ready-to-deliver bunks for kids in need. **Volunteering with Sleep in Heavenly Peace** (follow link for more information) can provide a number of wonderful benefits while learning how to build bunk beds. As volunteers we had the opportunity to learn how to use woodworking tools such as drills, sanders, and many other pieces of equipment. We measured, leveled, sanded, and stained wood; and even got to see how branding a bed works!

Foundation for the Future FAQs

Stewardship

As KirkWood embarks on our effort to raise funds for major building maintenance projects, we thought a quick review of what, when, how and why is important to clarify our reasons for the fundraising initiative.

What is Foundation for the Future?

Foundation for the Future is a fundraising effort to provide additional funds for priority building maintenance projects at KirkWood as recommended by the Property and Facilities Committee and approved by Session.

What will the money be used for?

Currently there are three projects that have been approved by Session:

- 1) replacement of the roof,
- 2) updates to the sound system in the sanctuary, and
- 3) sealing the parking lot and additional parking spaces.

How was KirkWood able to pay for the roof in 2023?


KirkWood has been blessed financially, and we have built a strategic reserve over time, which enabled us to proceed with the roof replacement when a favorable bid was received, and the weather was mild. Now we seek to repay what was 'borrowed' for the roof – something like moving savings to checking to pay large bills and paying yourself back over time.

Why is it important to support Foundation for the Future fundraising efforts?

KirkWood opened for worship services in July 1989 and the educational wing (classrooms and fellowship hall) was completed in 1996. To keep the building in good condition, the Property and Facilities Committee recommended completion of the three maintenance projects listed above that have been approved by Session. There may be additional projects in the next few years as we accommodate the changing needs of our church community.

What is the goal? And how long will this fundraising effort last?

This is actually the easiest question to answer. The fundraising goal is \$150,000 with \$101,400 already pledged or received as of February 29, 2024. So, we are more than half way to the goal! And we hope your support will get us to the goal by the end of this year.



Flock Your Friends for the Future

Foundations of the Future Wants to Flock Your Friends

Flamingos flocking in someone's yard usually shows they are pranked. This fundraising idea involves deploying a flock of pink plastic flamingoes in a friend's yard. Besides just trying to get a laugh out of the homeowners, these statues mean that someone is helping to raise money for KirkWood's capital campaign.

Yes, you could be a part of our fundraiser.

To flock a loved one costs \$40 for two (2) nights. When you purchase the flocking, you can request the days or chose first available. We will not guarantee that the homeowner will be on site for the flocking. On those days a flock of pink flamingos appear in the yard by "The Flamingo Marauders", and those who put them there sit back and enjoy at their prank. Don't worry, two (2) days after your chosen home has been flocked, our "Flamingo Marauders" will cause the flock to disappear from the yard. Also, early pickup of the flock can be purchased for \$30.

Sharing photos of your, or your loved ones, flocked yard are strongly encouraged!

If you do not want to be flocked, and strongly believe you will be (Pastor Chris), you may purchase Flamingo Insurance. We have several tiers for you to participate in:

Protection for a 1-time flocking costs \$30


Protection from flocking for 1 week costs \$45

Protection from flocking for 1 month costs \$60

Protection from flocking permanently costs \$100

All proceeds from flocking will go to the Foundations of the Future capital campaign fund. That is 100%.
