

KirkWood Family,

If you read my letter in the 2023 annual report, you might remember me saying that church growth brings challenges. Sure, a church being stuck, plateaued, or in decline brings some too, but there's a predictable, distinctive set that comes with growth as well.

What I'd like to do in this article is pass along a summary of the very best research on this topic. I'll be pulling from a synopsis written by a

retired Canadian pastor turned podcaster and leadership guru - Carey Nieuwhof.

So, what are anticipatable growth pains in a church? Here are four:

- 1) As more people come, the church will find itself in a kind of tug of war to quote the article, "In a growing organization, you will always have more demands than you'll have time... If you're not careful, more and more of your energy and attention will be pulled from the creativity, outreach, and interpersonal engagement with those who don't attend the church that fueled your growth spurt. Merely managing a church isn't a way to keep it growing."
- 2) Without great systems that foster care for people, you won't care for people again, let me cite the piece directly, "Many churches and their leaders are afraid of systems and structure because they think it means the creation of bureaucracy. But bureaucracy stifles mission. Great systems fuel it. Like an office tower designed to house thousands of people, great systems and structure support the goals of the organization with lean but solid processes around finances, management, discipleship, relationship-building, etc. Without structure, freedom and creativity collapse into chaos and disorganization."

A P.S. on this: the development of clear systems, structures, and communication might be even more vital for a congregation that is seeing the total number of those engaged rise beyond 150 or so. Or, to use the labels, is moving from being a "small church" to a "small medium-sized church." And that's KirkWood right now. We think that there are 200+ who are actively engaged with our congregation – that's not a small church by definition. Which leads directly to the next item from Nieuwhof's piece...

3) You won't know everyone's name. Many who attend a small church expect the church to be one big family – everyone knows everyone. The Oxford evolutionary psychologist Robin Dunbar was first to posit what is now a widely-held sociological maxim – a human can only maintain a stable connection with a maximum of 150 people (this is known, fittingly enough, as Dunbar's Number). That single factoid lies behind the tension many growing small congregations feel. As Nieuwhof puts it, "The point of church is not for everyone to know everyone. The point is for everyone to be known. So, create a church where everyone who wants to be known...is. You will reach far more people if you do."

A subset of this challenge is the need to integrate long timers at the church with newcomers. Very often, long timers have no remaining relational space in their lives: they have their specific group or class, they have their ministry or area of service, and there is no room to build relationships with a newcomer. Little else can cause growth to sputter out than long timers not being deliberate about connecting and building friendships with newcomers.

4) But, most importantly, there are certain attitude choices that are critical to keep a church growing...here are two:

Long timers can't treat newcomers as second-class citizens, nor insist that their own perspectives and preferences carry more weight because they've been at the church longer. (If anything, a newcomer's point of view may be more valuable because they can speak more accurately about the church's appeal in the present tense.) Building trust, camaraderie, and a shared sense of purpose between long timers and newcomers is an indispensable part of leaning into, and not short-circuiting, growth.

More people need to do more things. The 20% who have done 80% of the work must be willing to delegate to and empower others. In a growing church, you're moving away



from a few people doing a lot to more people doing less individually. Those who are used to being "in control" must be willing to have the church decentralized; those who have led in the past need to invest their time in creating and training new leaders to widen the leadership pool. And that 20% who so often carried the water in the past needs to say "no" on occasion so that new contributors are called into action and begin to take responsibility for the wellbeing of the congregation.

I pray that this helps make all of us mindful of what we're currently facing, and how we can proceed together in such a way that we don't undercut the growth we've experienced. With growth comes requisite intentionality and renewed resolve. But the good news is that the God who brought forth the growth will be the same God who helps us sustain it, provided we're willing to build our church His way. (1st Corinthians 3.5-7). Never forget – ours is the great privilege of being God's coworkers in the spiritual construction of KirkWood Presbyterian Church, which is no less than one small part of His new creation project in the world (1st Corinthians 3.9).

Stewardship

Giving is a spiritual discipline like prayer, Bible study, and worship.

When we started to learn about Christ as children, did we begin by praying for many hours, reading five chapters of the Gospels, and worshipping for an hour?? No, we began our spiritual journey learning short Bible stories and verses.

We most likely began giving as children by giving a portion of our allowance. And we did so in a comfortable environment. Mom and Dad paid for food, clothing, shelter, transportation, and everything else.

The point is that we develop faithfulness by starting small, then growing and finishing strong over time. Progress in our spiritual journey is very often in parallel with our movement along the giving path.

Steps along the Giving Path

First Time Giver – Begin to give, any amount and any frequency. As we begin the Giving Path journey, we begin to give to God out of a love and understanding of who God is in our life.

Intentional Giver – Plan to give a percentage of your income for the year. With growth in our discipleship, we begin to plan for the year what percentage of our income we want to give out of the blessings we have received.


Growing Giver – Increase your percentage of income as you move toward becoming a "tither". As we grow in our learning and giving of our time and talents, we may be moved to increase the percentage.

Tither - Begin to give the Biblical tithe (10% of your gross income). The word "tithe" simply means 10 percent. Tithing is the principle of putting God first in our lives and giving the first 10 percent of our income.



Extravagant Giver – Giving beyond the tithes. We soon discover a new joy, and our lives are transformed because of our love for God and our relationship with Jesus Christ. This giving becomes an offering out of a deeper gratitude and generosity.

How we use our resources is primarily a spiritual issue, not a financial one. God does not need our money; rather, we need to give it as an act of gratitude and trust. Prayerfully consider how you will support KirkWood and its ministries in the new year.






Blood Drives Schedule for 2024

This valuable organization provided us the "Wish List" (see below). Volunteers from St. Luke's pantry program supports residents of York County and Poquoson. No referral is required, but recipients must show proof of residency with eligible clients receiving assistance eight times per year.
