Given that we've just started a four-week exploration of joy as portrayed in the New Testament letter of Philippians, I thought I'd devote this space to a great devotional from the United Church of Christ on joy in an unjust world: the author puts into words a tension we all feel.

"You crown the year with your bounty, your wagon tracks overflow with richness. The pastures of the wilderness overflow, the hills gird themselves with joy, the meadows clothe themselves with flocks, the valleys deck themselves with grain, they shout and sing together for joy." – Psalm 65: 11-13

People sometimes ask how I go about writing one of these devotions. I usually begin by reading the several Scripture readings for my assigned date. I mull them over. I listen for which text or verses intrigue or provoke, disturb or delight.

One of the passages for today is Psalm 65, a psalm of such praise and joy it fairly shimmers. Its final verses, three of which are above, celebrate the abundance of the harvest. "These are so beautiful," I think. Reading them I see the light-charged wheat and oat fields, the herds of black and red cattle, the racing streams and waterways, and tall skies of my eastern Oregon homeland.

Becoming a Ruling Elder on Session

Let's be honest. For years, the scariest words many KirkWood members fear the most have been "WILL YOU SERVE ON SESSION?" All of the session members had the immediate emotions of "I'm not worthy" or "I don't have the time" or "It takes so much work" or "I don't want to get involved in the drama and politics of church life."

What if we told you that being a ruling elder can be rewarding? There is the opportunity to grow exponentially in your faith journey. You can really develop your leadership skills and you can help guide the direction of KirkWood for the next five to ten years. Yes, the work is challenging, but often, the rewards far outweigh the challenges.

In a nutshell, Session is made up of 12 elected elders. Each term is four years with 1/3 of the Session members rotating every year. In the Presbyterian Church, the Elders set policy, control the budget, chair the various Sessional Committees, and work closely with the pastor and the rest of staff. At KirkWood, we try to work with members and staff to plan and guide the church for the next several years. Our guiding principle is our vision statement which reads: "KirkWood is a Christian community growing together, knowing, loving, and serving Christ, to make Him known to all."

Over the next couple of months, we will share articles on what it is like to be a Session member. We come in all shapes and sizes, and we all bring unique gifts to the table. We'll share the process, the training, and the various jobs that Session fills.

By mid-summer, the Nominating Committee will start getting together to prayerfully consider four open Session positions and who we believe would be best able to share their gifts and be future leaders at KirkWood. If you get approached, don't run and hide. Consider it an honor to be asked whether you agree to serve or not. It just means that lots of folks think that you have some unique gifts to help KirkWood move into the future.

On April 23rd, I spoke briefly about communication and how it relates to our Stewardship. In today's world, communication is vitally important -particularly when fewer people actually attend Sunday service and many have never heard the "Good News". As Followers of Christ, we must be intentional about how we communicate verbally, by our actions, and through the myriad of social media available.

The KirkWood vision statement calls us to "... grow together to love, know, and serve God and *make Him known to all*" Yes, I am referring to the often despised task of "evangelism"! The early disciples were so overwhelmed by the risen Christ that they could not stop telling others. We should have that same enthusiasm about the "Good News" and furthering God's kingdom here on earth.

Years ago, Mark Mittelberg, an evangelism strategist, spoke at KirkWood. His message was "Just walk across the room". Mark's visit created a buzz but KirkWood never fully captured the evangelical spirit.

I hear it and have said it: "Evangelism is just not one of my gifts." But God does work in unusual ways. KirkWood's rapid adoption of livestreaming and other social media during COVID have been eye opening to reaching out to others. The new world of communication has radically changed the evangelism landscape. Communication must become a "ministry" for each of us; right up there with praying for others, serving those in need, loving our neighbor, and following Christ's example in all we do.
