KirkWood Family,

There's been quite a bit of buzz in the American church world over the last few months about the new book, "The Great Dechurching: Who's Leaving, Why Are They Going, and What Will It Take to Bring Them Back," written by Jim Davis (pastor) and Michael Graham (director of The Keller Center for Cultural Apologetics).

I'd like to pass along a few of its insights, at the least, so you don't have to read the whole book in order to benefit from it:

1. We are currently experiencing the single largest and fastest religious shift in the history of America, as upwards of 40 million adults have disaffiliated with church. (pg. 3)

2. This is especially seen among 18-35 year olds: in the mid 1980s about 87% of that age range identified as Christian, whereas now just over half do. The era of the steepest decline, the tipping point you might say, was the 1990s. (pg. 6)

3. Among those adults who have left church and/or Christianity, here are the top 5 reasons they did: 1) the culture wars promulgated by churches, 2) the lack of love and Christian character, 3) the church's unwillingness to listen, 4) the church's unwillingness to engage with other points of view, and 5) the church's racial insensitivity and attitudes. (pgs. 10-11)

4. Since 2016, the single largest block of those adults dechurching are called "exvangelicals," those who attended or were involved with evangelical/conservative churches and have now departed. For this particular group, they tended to leave because a) they felt a growing incongruity with the views and values of the congregation, b) they didn't see or experience much love in their church, c) they had a negative experience in the church, and d) they disagreed with the politics of the church (pgs. 68-69, 74-75)

5. The stats demonstrate that there have been two successive missed "generational handoffs" of Christianity, that is, the older passing the faith and church life on to the younger. The first and most consequential was between millennials (those between 27-42 years old) and older generations. The second and steeper was between Gen Z (those between 18-27 years old) and previous generations. (pgs. 148-150)

The last major section of the book includes strategies for churches who wish to engage and include the dechurched. (More on those another time perhaps.) But for now, let me share the exhortation that ends that section and the book as a whole:

The American church today is at a crossroads. While the kingdom of God will go on, its future in this country is not certain. The first path at this crossroads is the path of fighting for power and authority in society. If we choose this path, we put our supreme hopes in political parties...Or we make the walls between the world and the church as high as possible, shielding us from the world's influence. We compromise our doctrines and do gymnastics with the Bible to maintain some semblance of a following. We live in the past. We live in denial. This path will diminish our gospel witness and will relegate the church to inevitable irrelevance for generations.

The second path is to embrace our position as exiles, exercising our influence from the margins of power instead of its seat...It will mean taking a hard look at how we interact with the world around us. It will require constant prayer and humble hearts. But this is the path that will lead to the flourishing of the church...



We believe there is hope. The path forward is not easy, but it is simple... The weight of the reality of those departing the church in America can cause us to want to put our heads in the sand. But God and His grace allows us to acknowledge and sit with the gravity of grief that rightfully accompanies the Great Dechurching. It allows us to own our responsibility for the departing, whatever that may be... The Great Dechurching could well be the American church's most crucial moment, wakeup call, and greatest opportunity.


