## The Sermon - In 10 Sentences Or Less Perfectly Imperfect Faith (Week 2) - Abel's Faith:

1. Our stroll through Hebrews 11 will focus on all the overlooked minor characters mentioned, the first of which is Abel (11.4).



- 2. Abel's name tells us a lot (Genesis 4.2): it is the same Hebrew root as "vanity/emptiness" in the well-known refrain in Ecclesiastes, and contrasts with his older brother Cain, the gift from God (4.1).
- 3. The story of Cain/Abel in Gen. 4 presumes the later Mosaic law as a backdrop; the story hinges on one brother obeying the "law of firsts or first fruits" and one not (Exodus 22.29-30; Proverbs 3.9-10).
- 4. Cain kills Abel because his shoddy offering isn't recognized by God and Abel's is, reversing the favoritism shown to Cain by his family (4.8).
- 5. The unjust act screams out to God (4.10), the text using a verb reversed in the Old Testament only for those who are oppressed.
- 6. One thing that sets Abel apart from so many others in Hebrews 11 is that he isn't particularly heroic or successful; rather, he was just obeying what God had already made plain and clear, that is, it was an everyday or ordinary kind of obedience.
- 7. In order to live by "the law of firsts" in our own lives, we must ask ourselves the following a) Will I safeguard having my best available to God and others, and not just scraps (Malachi 1.10):; b) Will I give my first and best, even when I'm overlooked or discounted by others, like Abel was?; c) Who am I at my best, and is that what I'm giving others?; d) Do I trust God enough to give Him and others my best and first, knowing that "what I give is what I get back" (Luke 6.38)?
- 8. Abel's unremarkable obedience was met with remarkable, surprising, disproportional resistance (in fact, it cost him his life).
- 9. Jesus warns us to expect the same thing: our ordinary, everyday commitment to "righteousness" (that which is good, just, and right) will garner pushback and, sometimes, violent reprisal (Matthew 5.9-10).

## **Scripture Reading This Week**
