The Sermon - In 10 Sentences Or Less Perfectly Imperfect Faith 6 - Jephthah's Faith:

1. We ended our six week foray into Hebrews 11 yesterday: by asking us to define New Testament faith by way of Old Testament examples, the author has shattered any notions we might have of a pristine or idealized spiritual life.



- 2. If the heroes of the faith can be so blatantly unheroic, maybe that means you and I can be unheroic heroes too?
- 3. Yesterday we considered Jephthah, mentioned in Hebrews 11.32-34, whose story is told in Judges 10.6 12.7.
- 4. He was an outcast at an early age and leader of a band of outlaws, who then God used to rescue Gilead from the Ammonites.
- 5. He promised Yahweh that if He granted victory, then Jephthah would offer a human sacrifice in His honor, something the Mosaic Law decried (Judges 11.29-40; Deut. 12.31).
- 6. The first lesson about faith that we can learn from Jephthah's story is sometimes, the first act of faith is healing.
- 7. If we wonder why God isn't using us to impact others more or why our spiritual life seems mundane, we might need to ask what hurts am I holding onto, ignoring, or unwilling to address.
- 8. As we see in Jephthah when he blames all of Gilead for his family's mistreatment of him, a sure sign that you have unresolved, hindering past wounds is that they've spread and become exaggerated (Judges 11.7).
- 9. The second lesson about faith that we find in Jephthah is that outside cultural forces often distort our understanding of who God is; this is how he ended up offering a human sacrifice to the God of Israel.
- 10. We too would be wise to pay attention to how our own culture warps or skews how we understand God and His character.
