The Sermon - In 10 Sentences Or Less

Surprise the World (Week 1): Evangelism for the Rest of Us:

1. "Evangelism" is a word we've come to equate with "proselytizing," complete with the negative stereotypes we sometimes associate with that.



- 2. So the first thing we need to do is "unbox evangelism," that is, free it from the cultural constraints we've put on it: e.g., it's not merely transactional/contractual, it's not principally about what happens to you after you die, it's not "one size fits all", etc.
- 3. 1st Peter 3.15 tells us that we don't need to have all the answers we engage with a nonChristian, we just need to have an answer our "hope"; we may not be an expert on everything, but we certainly are experts on that.
- 4. Colossians 4.5-6 instructs us to conduct ourselves wisely toward those outside of the Christian faith, which in part means to ensure our speech is always gracious toward them.
- 5. Their questions are an opportunity for connection, not correction.
- 6. Spiritual awakening in adults and teens has some predictable facets: the first is "coming to the end of yourself," which proves to be the catalyst for all subsequent steps.
- 7. Those beginning to wake up spiritually will be "questing" (seeking, learning, exploring, etc.), even if no one can tell, and then they'll need to encounter an "advocate/ambassador" (2nd Cor. 5.18-20) who will invest in and walk with them.
- 8. Often, they will need to belong before they believe, that is, become a part of a community of faith who receives them graciously, embraces them in their messiness, is not intimidated by their questions or hurt, etc.
- 9. Those awakening up spiritually will come to a point of commitment, far more often than not this is gradual, not dramatic.
- 10. Let's save the word "evangelism": it comes from the New Testament word "euangelion," which simply means "good news," as in, God is doing a new thing in Christ, and it is good news that you and I have been invited to get onboard with what He is doing.
